


Vaccines



Why are vaccines important?

- Vaccines work with your body's natural defenses to protect against infection and help reduce the risk of disease
- Check with your doctor to see if the vaccines below are right for you

How to get the lowest out-of-pocket cost for your vaccines



Common vaccines covered under Medicare Part B

- Influenza (flu)
- Pneumococcal
- Hepatitis B for individuals at medium or high risk for hepatitis
- Tetanus for injury or exposure*

The It's Your Choice (IYC) Medicare Advantage plan covers 100% of the cost of Part B vaccines when you present your UnitedHealthcare member ID card at the pharmacy or physician's office.**

*Your IYC plan has enhanced coverage for the Tetanus vaccine when used preventively and administered in the physician's office.

**An office visit cost-share may apply if other services are provided.



Common vaccines covered under Medicare Part D that you should receive at a pharmacy

- Shingles
- Tetanus for preventive use
- Hepatitis A
- Hepatitis B for individuals at low risk for hepatitis

Show your Navitus Health Solutions (Navitus) member ID card at the pharmacy when you receive these vaccines.

If you receive Part D vaccines in the physician's office, you must submit a reimbursement form to Navitus for repayment of the vaccine. You will have a copay and may have other costs according to Navitus' reimbursement rate.





Use your Medicare red, white and blue ID card when getting the following vaccine

- COVID-19*

*You will have \$0 cost-share on FDA-authorized COVID-19 vaccines.



Did you know?

- It is important to get a new flu shot every year because flu viruses are constantly changing¹
- For adults 50+ — Shingrix vaccine is about 90% effective at preventing shingles and long-term nerve pain²
